10 years ago, within the framework of the scientific activities of the **Institute for Medieval Studies (IEM) of NOVA/FCSH**, we convened our first Workshop devoted to this theme (“O estudo dos manuscritos iluminados e dos artefactos na Arqueologia da Idade Média: metodologias em comparação”), marking a significant moment of reflection and scholarly exchange.

Today, as we commemorate the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the inaugural event, this second interdisciplinary Workshop seeks to advance our knowledge of the outcomes generated by archaeological methodologies in the study of illuminated manuscripts.

Organized by the **IEM** and the **IUS ILLUMINATUM Research Team**, in collaboration with the **Istituto Italiano di Cultura - Lisbon** and the **Fondazione Biblioteca Capitolare** of Verona, this Workshop features the participation of researchers from the **Opificio delle Pietre Dure** in Florence, together with scholars from other esteemed institutions and aims to demonstrate how archaeological sciences and their methodologies can meaningfully contribute to the study of these manuscripts, offering new and important insights that often transcend the scope of traditional approaches in art history, as well as in artistic, palaeographic, and codicological studies.

By integrating multiple disciplines, we aspire to open new perspectives and to foster a stimulating dialogue among archaeology, history, art history, conservation, and related fields, thereby enriching our understanding of these invaluable testimonies of the past.

We hope that this meeting will provide an opportunity for further advances in the study of illuminated manuscripts and reinforce the essential value of a multidisciplinary approach to the study of these artefacts.

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
